## WHY IT IS GROWING

The Digital Personal Data Protection Act, 2023 is the most significant new compliance obligation for Indian businesses since GST. Every company that collects personal data — which is effectively every business — now has statutory obligations around consent, data fiduciaries, grievance redressal, and data localisation. The Rules under the Act, expected in 2025-26, will further expand the compliance surface. Simultaneously, cyber incidents have become board-level events, driving demand for incident response counsel.

### WHY IT IS GROWING

## WHY IT IS GROWING

India processes more real-time digital payments than the rest of the world combined. The RBI's regulatory sandbox, CBDC pilots, account aggregator framework, and the emerging regulation of virtual digital assets (VDA) have created an entirely new legal compliance landscape. Fintech companies — from payment aggregators to neo-banks to crypto exchanges — all require specialist legal counsel who can navigate the RBI, SEBI, and IFSCA regulatory matrix.

## WHY IT IS GROWING

The Indian Space Policy 2023 and the establishment of IN-SPACe (Indian National Space Promotion and Authorisation Centre) transformed India's space sector from a public monopoly to an open, regulated market. ISRO commercial arm NewSpace India Limited, private launch companies like Skyroot and Agnikul, and satellite operators like OneWeb India now all require legal support. Global space law is also evolving rapidly — the Artemis Accords, lunar resource rights, and on-orbit servicing contracts all need lawyers.

Indian lawyers are increasingly appearing in London, Singapore, and Paris-seated proceedings, and the flow of inbound investment — BIT arbitration, infrastructure disputes, commercial deals — is generating sustained demand.

Every significant M&A transaction now requires a competition clearance analysis, and digital market dominance has become a primary enforcement focus.

## WHY IT IS GROWING

India's four Labour Codes — Code on Wages (2019), Industrial Relations Code (2020), Code on Social Security (2020), and Occupational Safety, Health and Working Conditions Code (2020) — consolidate 44 central labour laws into a fundamentally restructured framework. Implementation has been delayed but is expected to roll out from 2025-26 with state rules. Every Indian employer faces a complete reorientation of their HR legal compliance. Simultaneously, gig economy classification, remote work, and AI-driven workforce restructuring are creating entirely new employment law questions.
